Community College Students: Looking for an opportunity to build your health research skills? Apply to the Summer Research Experience!

Allied Health Academy Summer Research Experience benefits:

- Increase your competitiveness for graduate school through a six-week research program.
- Gain research skills on faculty-led health projects.
- Join a community of like-minded, driven peers with interests in allied health professions.
- Receive graduate school preparation guidance and professional development.
- Earn \$2,160 for completing the program.

Minimum Eligibility Criteria to Apply to be an Allied Health Academy Summer Research Intern:

- Interested in pursuing a career in allied health (e.g. mental health, public health, social work, physical therapy, and/or speech therapy).
- Full-time or part-time undergraduate students who are Currently enrolled at Cypress College or Fullerton College (with at least 30 transferable units).
- Minimum cumulative GPA of 2.70 or higher (must submit unofficial transcript via e-mail).
- U.S. Citizen, non-citizen national, or foreign national who possesses a visa permitting permanent residence in the United States.¹
- From an economically **OR** educationally disadvantaged background as defined by the following:
 - Economically disadvantaged: Low-income background.²
 - Educationally disadvantaged: First generation college student³ **OR** from a racial or ethnic group underrepresented in graduate education.⁴

¹ Individuals with temporary or student visas (e.g., F-1, J-1) or AB-540 undocumented students may participate in the Academy as guests, but will not be eligible to receive financial support.

² Proof of income must be provided through a Student Aid Report (SAR) form for the 2018-2019 academic year. ([FAFSA.ed.gov: What is the Student Aid Report?](https://fafsa.ed.gov/What-is-the-Student-Aid-Report/)) Individuals meet the criteria for low-income background if their **2018** annual family income does not exceed the following guidelines.
